Citizens can use these points to advocate for a more informed and sustainable approach to the restoration of Mission Bay Park.

1. Sea Level Rise Analysis:

- We need a comprehensive analysis of how sea level rise will affect public assets in Mission Bay Park.
- The city should not proceed with this restoration plan without a thorough assessment, especially considering the Regional Water Quality Control Board's requirement for 80 acres of restored wetlands by 2100.

2. Climate Action Plan Consideration:

- The 2022 Climate Action Plan recognizes the value of tidal wetlands in carbon sequestration.
- However, the draft PEIR doesn't adequately assess how proposed tidal wetland acreage contributes to meeting CAP requirements. This analysis is crucial for comparing different alternatives.

3. Inclusion of City Parks Master Plan:

- The Draft PEIR mentions the importance of "other plans" in project feasibility, but it neglects to consider the 2021 City of San Diego Parks Master Plan. It's imperative to include this plan and evaluate all alternatives against its goals, especially those that prioritize accessible tidal wetland habitats over other land uses.

4. Water Quality as a Goal:

- The DEIR lacks a focus on water quality that aligns with the underlying, guiding Master Plan document.
- To address this gap, a new Project Objective should be added to emphasize the importance of improving water quality through resilient wetland infrastructure as stated by the Project Objectives.
